Our March Towards Integral Ecology in the Footsteps of Our Founding Mother, Mother Marie Moisan

We are writing about the actions and experiences of our Sisters at rue Lhomond and the community of the Pères du Saint-Esprit in Paris.



This community includes Sisters Françoise Moreau, Marie-Anna and Marie-Chantal. Their work is admirable!

When I visited these Sisters for a short or long stay, I was amazed by the discreet and efficient work of these women, with their simple, welcoming hearts. At the Spiritan Fathers, given the variable attendance at meals, often have a surplus of food left over. The Fathers take care of putting it in boxes and storing it in a fridge. However, our Sisters at rue Lhomond, imbued with our charism, make us sensitive to the vulnerable. So they offer surplus meals to

men, women and families of limited means, such as those at the C.H.R.S Moisan Delaplace (Centre d'hébergement et de réinsertion sociale) of the Cités Caritas association, located at 41 rue Lhomond in Paris.



We appreciate the commitment and cooperation of these two religious families on rue Lhomond. Sister Marie-Anna, assisted by Monsieur Marcel Paulot, transports the boxes to the community kitchen in one or two carts. Each of them carries out a specific task, in a spirit of peace and silence.

Sister Françoise Moreau is in charge of filling the individual boxes with food.

Sister Marie-Chantal labels the boxes and places them in the Centre Moisan Delaplace fridge. Their relationship with residents is one of respect and courtesy.

Sister Marie-Anna takes care of washing up and tidying up. This activity takes place in a friendly atmosphere. They pay special attention to waste, which is deposited in compost bins at the Spiritan Fathers' home. The pigeons of Paris feast all day long: "They neither sow nor reap"!



This daily activity is part of our journey towards integral ecology, where everything is linked. They are following in the footsteps of our Foundress. My heartfelt thanks to our Sisters at rue Lhomond for their effective and efficient presence in their environment.

Radical Change: Starting with the Poorest...



I was able to take part in these three days, where debates, presentations of seeds already sown for a better ecology, questioning and observations shake up our way of looking at, analyzing and debating. It's been a rich three days, as I've heard some fine commitments, admired nature and human, ecological nature, and the commitment of several associations and business leaders. It's a bold undertaking to summarize what I've heard, and I don't want to misrepresent what I've heard from the speakers.

I'd like to share with you what caught my attention, the appeals, the urgent need for us to set off collectively so that the countries concerned take into account not only the disruption of nature but also the consequences of certain actions, debates and decisions that are damaging our common home. While Laudato Si' contributes to a shared awareness, developments in climate, biodiversity and inequality are making the situation worse.

I liked the words of a Franciscan friar: "Laudato Si' shows that we are facing a crisis with multiple dimensions: ecological, economic,

social, and even theological...". He quotes Saint Francis, saying: "He could not have composed the Canticle of Creatures without first experiencing the encounter with the lepers: it was there that he discovered the meaning of fraternity. Because Francis discovers in the leper a brother, beyond all that separates, the sun can become a brother, the Earth becomes "Sister to Mother Earth". "Participation is a buzzword, an indispensable attitude, but it's participation to the last that we need to build... The poorest can be unifying figures in our debates. They don't provide the solution, but they help to create the links that make action possible... Poverty kills. We must never forget that. Nature is the place where a gift is revealed... We need to integrate a vision of nature as a partner in our human development and our divine vocation."

On Saturday afternoon, I signed up for the "learning trip to Vaulx-en-Velin". When we got off the bus, I discovered a completely different landscape. It's all grey, there's no tarmac where I'm walking, just a semblance of a parking lot with cars parked in the mud. It was better to watch where I put my feet. There are many migrants and few stores. The story tells me that **Mas du Taureau** is a district of the town of Vaulx-en-Velin, in the eastern suburbs of Lyon, France.

In 1990, riots broke out in this neighborhood following the death of a young motorcyclist who was trying to break through a police roadblock. The riots lasted three nights, causing fires and looting. Since then, the city has launched several renovation projects to transform the neighborhood and improve living conditions for residents. The migrants have all gathered in this neighborhood. Listening to the story, I'm reminded of the Berlin Wall in Germany, destroyed in 1989. East on one side, West on the other. Both were unable to cohabit, leaving little room for the ability to be recognized as a person and not an entity. We are a small group interested in the association "Le Cœur du Mas Cuisine".





We are warmly welcomed by a retired volunteer who tells us the story of the founding of this association. I'm amazed by the audacity and hope of this woman, who for years has been going out to meet people in this large housing estate. She explains that between two buildings, there was a passageway tagged on both sides. We're in a very working-class neighborhood, with citizens living in very precarious conditions. Our volunteer sits down on a bench and, as the residents approach, she engages them in conversation. With other residents, actions are set up: how to make household products, eat well for cheap, implement zero waste, fetch unsold food and learn to cook. They set up a collective to plant rose bushes, and learned how to make rosewater and prepare a rosewater flan.

Little by little, their actions are being recognized. The social landlord invites them around a table to avoid closing off a passageway. "We wanted to create a living environment for lonely, isolated people. The most important thing was to bring in know-how and interpersonal skills. It took three years to build the new premises, which since January 2023 has offered a wide range of activities focusing on simplicity, zero waste, cooking, sewing, embroidery and drawing. Children are happy to come here, and mothers who don't work come to share their culture. The cultural mix is important to accept and understand each other's differences.

On Friday evenings, we're invited to watch the documentary "Bigger than Us", which aired on FRANCE 5 on December 11, 2023. A documentary not to be missed, because as the director, Flore Vasseur tells us: it's a film that's been thought up for the world with a spiritual dimension. "For me, everything is linked, because the environment of young people is at war, lacking food, suffering from global warming... But beyond all that, I saw how beautiful humanity is because, on a human scale, we're all the same age."

The director of this film invites us with these words:

"There's something inside you that's bigger than you, so set it free".



Film synopsis: For the past 6 years, 18-year-old Melati has been fighting the plastic pollution ravaging her country, Indonesia. Like her, a generation is rising up to repair the world. Everywhere, teenagers and young adults are fighting for human rights, the climate, freedom of expression, social justice, and access to education and food. Alone against all odds, sometimes risking their lives and safety, they protect, denounce and care for others. And they change everything.

Melati sets off to meet them across the globe. She wants to understand how to keep going and continue her work. From the favelas of Rio to the remote villages of Malawi, from makeshift boats off the island of Lesbos to Native American ceremonies in the mountains of Colorado, Rene, Mary, Xiu, Memory, Mohamad and Winnie reveal a magnificent world of courage and joy, of commitment to something greater than oneself. At a time when

everything seems to be falling apart, these young people show us how to live. And what it means to be in the world today.
