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Editorial

On March 22 and April 22, we celebrated with the world community, the World Water and Earth Days. From 19 to 26 May 2024, we join with all Catholic Christians around the world in celebrating the 9th edition of the Laudato Si Week, whose theme is "Seeds of Hope". We give thanks to the Lord for the progress made since the publication of the Encyclical Laudato Si' in 2015.

An awareness of the gravity of today's cultural and ecological crisis must be translated into new habits. L.S. 209, Yes, we can plant positive actions on the soil of our planet every day through our small gestures which directly and significantly affect the world around us, such as avoiding the use of plastic and paper, reducing water consumption, separating refuse, cooking only what can reasonably be consumed, treat other living beings with care and kindness, using public transport or car-pooling, planting trees, turning off unnecessary lights, reuse and don't throw away too quickly...L.S. 211.

One of the major ecological challenges of the coming years is to reduce the use of plastic with the final goal of eradicating it. Omnipresent in everything from food to clothing to cleaning products, it is estimated that by 2050 there will be more plastic in the ocean than fish. In addition to its worrying effects on human, animal and wildlife health, plastic takes several hundred years to decompose. We can take action by avoiding single-use plastic products as much as possible, and by buying products with less packaging.

In this third edition of our green newsletter, we share with you the acts of love and seeds of hope that have been sown in our regions in recent months.

Environmental Care

With winter winding down, the ground has been watered with the melting of the snow and allowed to recover from all that it was used for last year. It is time to begin the planning for our gardens and what trees, shrubs and plants we will plant to beautify God's creation.



Our new home in Urbana has many areas to plant perennials and shrubs. Our new deck provides a perfect landscaping area for dwarf shrubs and colorful flower beds. We will plant a vegetable garden again this year, hopefully the wildlife will refrain from eating the plants before the fruits can grow.

In Batavia the area near the maintenance man's garage/office will once again be planted with many different vegetation. The above ground planters and fenced in areas provide space to accommodate several types of vegetables that allow them to share the produce. Many new trees have been planted over the last couple of years due to the loss of some of their more mature trees that were either deceased or damaged by storms.

In Kankakee, we lost several trees last year, including one that was 350 years old. All of them will be replaced with a variety of trees, some fruit trees have already been planted near the hermitages that we hope will bring the deer around more often. Sr. Carol Karnitsky has already shared news of the Walking Madonna that was carved from the stump of the 350-year-old tree. Hopefully we will not lose any more trees during some storms.

Our Lady of Peace also has a vegetable garden near the house where the sisters can go out to the porch to enjoy the fresh air and watch the gardens grow. The farmland across the street also provides beauty as the corn and

beans grow throughout the summer. The deer seem to enjoy visiting the corn fields as much as the sisters enjoy watching them flourish.

In addition to the vegetation on our properties that provide food for the sisters, many organizations invite people to take part in community gardens. Some of the participants live in apartments, which prohibits their ability to have gardens. Taking part in the community gardens also creates the opportunity to meet people, one of the projects Faith in Action sponsors provides outreach to individuals in independent living facilities and nursing homes where the residents use above ground planters to plant anything they wish. It was at one of these gardens that some residents met their neighbors for the first time, having lived next door to one another for a couple of years.



Taking care of the gifts that God has given us has many ways of giving back to those who participate, as well as to those who can only watch and enjoy the beauty of each plant and the friendships that are formed.

2024 Annual Retreat for SSCM Affiliates Cameroon/DR-Congo

"Jesus' View of Creation"



On the occasion of their traditional annual retreat, the Affiliates of the Congregation of the Servants of the Holy Heart of Mary met on March 22, 23 and 24, 2024 at the Casa Claret of the Claretian Missionaries on Nkolbisson Hill in Yaoundé. Three days of exchange, meditation and prayer on the thorny issue of environmental protection, a major concern for our Church. To better grasp the issue and bring the reflections to a successful conclusion, the Affiliates committee chose to focus on "Jesus' view of creation", the main theme of the retreat.

Starting with the first chapter of the Book of Genesis, the speaker of the day, Father Melvin NGWAKONGNWI NEBA, CMF, points out that, after creating heaven and earth and all living creatures, God saw that it was very good (Genesis 1:31). This is why Jesus' view of creation is one of love, goodness, harmony, coherence, order... Jesus looks upon a Creation, which thirsts to be restored to its original beauty, harmony and dignity. The Son of God came to save not only Man but also the beasts, the plants, the waters, the hills, the winds, the soil... The relationship of Man (who has received all powers from God) with Creation must change today by improving itself in order to recover the original harmony. Father Melvin urges each participant to have a "christified" view of Creation, that is, a view full of love and goodness, seeking harmony with our neighbor and other creatures, recognizing and respecting their dignity. Each and every one of us should therefore make a deep individual commitment, for it is from the sum of individual changes that the whole will emerge.





By a happy coincidence, on Saturday, March 23, 2024, the Casa Claret Fathers' community invited the Affiliates group to join them in living out the broad "Earth Hour" movement. Awareness has been raised in all communities, associations and people of good will around the world, so that from 8:30 pm to 9:30 pm local time, all lights are switched off.

The aim is to collectively reduce energy consumption by one hour, and thus have a positive impact on our

environment. Affiliates were delighted to join in this moment of communion and take part in this concrete action to safeguard Creation.
