Laudato Si' Week at the Sainte Thérèse de Montgeron School





Living Laudato Si'Week 2024 with the Cameroon Chapter

As part of our *Laudato Si'* week, the Cameroon Chapter has put several activities on the agenda to be carried out during the week, including two masses to be offered at the beginning and end of the week, and as a flagship activity, awareness-raising at the Vita course in Yaoundé, a privileged sports venue for the country's decision-makers.

We've planned our activities to be able to carry them out as effectively as possible. We met at 8 a.m. at the gate of the Vita course, where we waited for certain members of the circle. When we were all ready, we first went to the sanctuary of Mont Febe to offer our action to the Lord through the Virgin Mary.

We took as our theme for the day: "Catechesis on the promotion of integral ecology with children", reflected and shared on the theme, and concluded with the prayer of the day from the LSI week guide, a decade of the rosary and 30 minutes of adoration in the adoration chapel.



After this intense moment of prayer, we went back down to collect, or better still, clean up plastic bottles and plastics in the gullies and on the public highway around the Vita course, passing on a few messages to the



various athletes who were doing the same course as us. Our awareness-raising was greatly enhanced by the action we took in this

space, which was applauded by several expatriates and some Cameroonians. Some of them took the same action as us and encouraged us with words that they appreciated what we were doing.

It was a really good time spent together as a circle. On the site, there was a restaurant serving fruit juices and natural fruit, and we sat down to share the seasonal fruit at the end of our work. That was the end of our activity. We returned home happy to have made a gesture to safeguard our common home.

Healing Workshops



Pope Francis invites us to work from a Church that reaches out to existential peripheries and, with this premise in mind, since 2017, Sister Margarita Batalla, SSCM together with social psychologist María del Rosario Gamarra, have set up bereavement workshops for people going through this difficult journey due to the loss of loved ones.

The program, run in parishes in the town of Resistencia, in Argentina's Chaco region, is geared towards providing psychological and emotional support to different groups of people. The workshops last eight

weeks, with a weekly two-hour meeting.

During the pandemic, given the impossibility of organizing face-to-face meetings, "conversations" were organized on social networks. Currently, in Presidencia de la Plaza, workshops are held every 45 days in the homes of the Servants of the Holy Heart of Mary.

These spaces are designed as places for active listening, where confidentiality, free expression, and understanding are essential elements. They use projective resources such as art therapy, photo language, and artistic expression. It's a silent path, where pain, anger, and anguish plunge people into states of permanent sadness until they reach pathological states. These encounters thus become healing workshops.
