They are getting involved in a variety of ways, from planting a vegetable garden to enabling young people to reconnect with nature, from raising awareness of the need to clean up communal areas to making migratory problems visible.

Holy Family Province Commitment to Reuse, Repurpose and Recycle

The legacy of Pope Francis' call to all, to care of our planet, gives us guidance on ways in which we can contribute to the care of our common home. His love and care for our earth and our sisters and brothers inform each of us that we have a part to play in saving our planet. One way is to become aware of the legislation that our lawmakers are planning and the need to encourage our elected officials to act as caregivers of our common home and the people they are privileged to serve.



Some steps may seem small, but together they make a difference in insuring prosperity to our world. Water conservation and reforestation are one of the many ways our province has worked toward nurturing our common home. Due to weather events we have lost many trees, our province center lost trees, as well as many at our retreat house in Batavia. Those trees are being replaced. This effort is essential in maintaining the balance of oxygen in our environment. Our home in Urbana is also planting flowers and ground cover to help maintain and enrich the soil balance and to prevent erosion. Holy Heart of Mary Community plants a large vegetable garden offering the proceeds to our other communities and to those who are free to pick and use the fruits of their labor. Our Lady of Peace Community has a vegetable and herb garden.



Care for our earth and the marginalized communities we serve helps to even the playing field between the haves and have nots.

The St. Anne community in Rockford, IL, with the help of all of our communities save plastic grocery bags, and repurpose

them into mats for the homeless so they have a barrier between them and ground they use for sleeping. It takes approximately 750-1000 bags to make one mat. We prepare the bags and one of our affiliates crochets the bag strips together to make the mats.





Her goal is one mat per month. However, due to the diligence of our communities and others we have been able to prepare many of these bags so she can make more than one a month.



Many of our communities are saving cans, and sending them to Rockford, who then takes it to a recycling center where we are paid money for the material being recycled. The proceeds are saved and given to help people in need. The tabs on the cans are removed and saved, after saving a large amount they are given to the local Ronald McDonald house, who recycles them and uses the proceeds to aid in their outreach to family members who utilize the home while their children are being cared for at the hospital adjacent to the home. Sister Anne's sister Chris is now doing this, as our connection to the school community's access has been limited. We save these tabs and send them to Chris.

Sister Karen Carlson provided us with a presentation on the care of our common home that gave each of us ideas on how we can take care of our environment and the seemingly small ways in which we can contribute.

Some of the suggestions she shared are:

- Planting flowers or ground cover to aid in the production of oxygen rich soil.
- Limiting the use of water, take quick showers, turn of the water while brushing your teeth.
- Be vigilant on recycling, reusing and repurposing.
- Be sure to turn off lights
- Use less energy to heat, keep thermostat lower and dress appropriately
- Unplug items when not in use, or used less frequently.
- When possible buy items in glass containers that can later be repurposed.
- Try to do as many errands as possible on one trip.
- Minimize the amount of gasoline usage.
- Drive in groups when possible.

The people most affected by climate change are the poor and the marginalized. They are the folks that live nearby polluting industries, nuclear power plants. It is important to stand up and speak for those who are unable to speak for themselves, while supporting and encouraging those who can speak out



to do so. Our current President has removed many of the safeguards that were in place by the former president. Many of us have written to our legislators hoping to persuade them into compliance with the previous administration.

As part of the Laudato Si' week, Secours Catholique/Caritas France invited REPAM Colombia (its president, Bishop Omar Mejia of Florencia and his secretary, Juan Felipe Martinez), and REMAM (its secretary, Father Noël Ortiz and a Guatemalan community leader, Gloria Gonzalez).



I was invited to take part in this highly enriching meeting at the Maison des évêques, CEF, in Paris, on May 26, 2025.

Their presence gave us the opportunity to highlight, among other things, migration issues in Central America, as well as the important role played by the Catholic Church in these two sub-regions (Central America and Amazonia) with indigenous peoples. REPAM was heavily involved in the preparations for the Synod for Amazonia, and in the innovative follow-up to it. Its vice-president, Monsignor BARRETO, was our archbishop in Huancayo, Peru.
